Transitions: Indian Summers

I've been thinking about transitions a lot recently, for both personal and professional reasons. Even as I sit and write this, I'm looking out at a yard frosted with the first snow of the year. By the afternoon it has melted, but 24 hours earlier we went driving to find the fall foliage and hear the male elk bugling to corral the herds. And just a few days before that ... I was in shorts. This time of year is often called "Indian Summer" with the movement back & forth of temperature and precipitation. I'm beginning to plan for hot soups rather than cold salads for evening meals, or maybe we'll have both. And I can't pack away my shorts just yet because I'm sure I'll need them in the days ahead, but my fleece pants and sweaters need to be accessible as well. And there will be times I need them within the same day! However, as with all transitions, all of these will continue to co-exist, ebbing or growing on a day-to-day basis until finally we have moved from summer through fall into winter, and then into spring.

Personal and organizational transitions carry the same dynamics. The tools and skills and ways of organizing our lives work for a time but need to be altered, adjusted, and new ways of operating have to be incorporated otherwise we are caught wearing shorts when the snow arrives. William Bridges is an organizational consultant who specializes on the topic of transitions, having written several books on the subject. (including *Managing Transitions*, and *Way of Transition*) **Bridges writes that there are 3 elements operating continuously in any transition - Endings, Beginnings, and what he calls The Neutral Zone.** We understand endings and beginnings, but the neutral zone? It actually is the most creative time which allows us - demands from us - that we look at ourselves, our organizations, our ways of operating with new perspectives in order to effectively move into the new season. Yet it is also a time of chaos and resistance and fear when we attempt to cling to the habitual way

And choose one who can celebrate with you as you pull out new sweaters and discover hot soups that help you transition to the new season that is arriving.

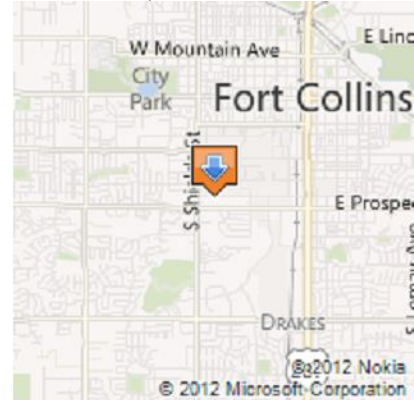
Whether you would like to join an existing group, help form a new group, or are interested in the Virtual Group, there is a place for you to feel connected and where you can safely discuss your life and ministry.

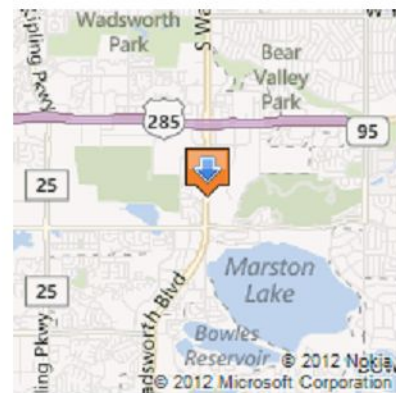
